Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design is a program and philosophy that seeks to deter and prevent criminal activity through the manipulation of the physical environment. Largely based on the teaching and research by Timothy D. Crowe of the University of Louisville, this approach to crime prevention seeks to promote the effective use of architectural design, landscape design, lighting implementation, and a variety of other techniques to encourage safe activities and discourage unsafe activities in and around the target property. The implementation of CPTED concepts can be as simple as the strategic placement of shrubbery, fencing, and lighting to more advanced concepts including building design and the routing or re-routing of vehicular and foot traffic patterns. Not only does the philosophy seek to make people safer in and around the target location, but also it seeks to create an environment where a would-be-criminal is unlikely to be able to successfully complete a criminal act. It seeks to create an environment where the commission of a criminal act would be more difficult and the likelihood of apprehension greater. It seeks to do this in a more subtle fashion compared to the more obvious security measures such as bars and gates. Many members of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department are available to provide a CPTED assessment of businesses or residences within the county. Feel free to contact Officer T.G. Pardue of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department with any questions about a CPTED assessment.

recommendations established by the Mayor's Blue Ribbon Committee on Chemical Safety. He was appointed Emergency Management Director in 1984 and consolidated the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Emergency Management office into the Charlotte Fire Department. He held this position until being promoted to Fire Chief in 1987.

During the 2001 Metro Fire Chief's convention, Chief Fincher was selected as the first recipient of the Metropolitan Fire Chief of the Year. Chief Fincher was appointed Homeland Security Director for the City of Charlotte in September 2002.
